



Champion takes unchallenged win

NO HOLDING HOPPÉ

Former British Champion, and current Gold Star national champion with the British Trials

and Rally Drivers Association, Mark Hoppé made a significant step towards retaining his Woolbridge Motor Club trials champion title with an emphatic win in difficult conditions at Hogcliff Hill. During the event, the six tests which were each used four times across the day, became extremely greasy which presented the drivers with a distinct challenge despite Clerk of the Course Richard Wilson's continual amendments to the tests in an effort to provide new grass and the opportunity of some traction. At the wheel of his pocket-sized Suzuki Alto and contesting Class One for two-wheel-drive production cars, made a positive start incurring just seven penalty points after the first

round of six tests to lead Andy Webb from Weymouth by a single point but by the end of

the second stanza the deficit between the two had ballooned to thirty with Webb and his Toyota Yaris T-Sport unable to match the scores of his adversary which in turn let Ben Joslin (sharing the drive with his work colleague Hoppé) and Bridport driver Gary Morris, at the wheel of his Vauxhall Corsa, to assume second and third places as the event paused for lunch. Hoppé ripped through the third round of tests dropping just eight marks, twelve less than Morris and without the opposition of the absent recently crowned British Champion Tim Dovey the Sherborne driver was a shoo-in for not only the best in Class One, where he

finished forty-six clear of Morris, but also for the overall victory once the index of performance of each competitor had been calculated. Yeovil driver Joslin claimed second in class thirteen points shy of Morris.







Weymouth, campaigned his Citroen Saxo. An early advantage was earned by the latter with a five-point lead after the first round but by the halfway stage Briant had reduced the margin to three points. The twelve afternoon tests promised a close battle and the duo delivered. Briant stole back four points to take the lead at the conclusion of the third round and bettered his opponent by two on the final round to claim the class win by three points. Sharing the drive in the Ka with Briant was Ben Waterworth who definitely benefitted from the experience of his coach in the left-hand seat and claimed the Novice Award. The rear-wheel-drive category was led throughout by Adam Smith from Wool. At the wheel of his Reliant Scimitar, Smith posted the lowest score on the first round dropping just six


halfway and maintaining that margin until the close of play.

points to lead the similar car of David Robinson increasing his advantage to twenty-one by


